Senator Square: CHS students, staff, and community deliver Christmas





SCHOLARSHIPS AWARDED TO CHS TEACHERS

The Carson City Schools Foundation gave away eight \$200 scholarships and one \$2,000 scholarship to Carson City School District teachers last week. CHS Ceramics teacher Alisa Kuniya received a \$200 scholarship for Backdrop and lighting for AP portfolios, and CHS' Comprehensive Life Skills teachers received a \$2000 scholarship to purchase appliances for the life skills program. According to Valerie N.
