GRADUATION RATES INCREASE FOR FOURTH YEAR IN A ROW



For the fourth year in a row, Carson City highest rate ever at 86.79 percent for the Class of 2019, an increase of 6.48 percentage points since 2016 where it averaged 80.31 percent.

Carson High School achieved a graduation rate of 95.90 percent, up 7.80 percentage points since 2016 when it averaged 88.10 percent. Pioneer High School achieved a graduation rate of 82.35 percent, up 10.35 percentage points since 2016 when it averaged 72.00 percent.







SCHOOL DISTRICT AND TRUSTEES HAUL IN AWARDS AT NASB



The Carson City School District was a point of highlight at the Nevada Association of School Boards (NASB) Annual Conference in Reno, this past November. The school district and trustees hauled in nearly a quarter of all the awards (4 out of 19) among the 17 districts statewide. Additionally, two Carson City School Board trustees were recognized for their service and achievements in their roles as NASB elected officers.



TWO TEACHERS EARNED NATIONAL BOARD CERTIFICATIONS, ONE RENEWED

The Carson City School District celebrated two new National Board Certified Teachers (NBCT) from the <u>National Board of Professional Teaching Standards</u> (NBPTS). Recognition came at the Jan. 28, 2020 school board meeting. NBCT is widely considered to be the highest professional recognition for educators and includes a five percent pay increase in acknowledgement of accomplished teaching.

The teachers recognized earning certification were **Christina Bourne**, NBCT for Music in Early and Middle Childhood and Mark Twain Elementary School music teacher; and **Debra Crozier**, NBCT as a Generalist in Early Childhood. Additionally, **Rachel Croft**, fourth grade teacher at Bordewich Bray Elementary, renewed her NBCT for Literacy: Reading-Language Arts in Early and Middle Childhood.



REMINDER: NO DOGS OR PETS ALLOWED ON SCHOOL CAMPUSES



The Carson City School District would like to remind parents and families, only with the exception of "service animals," **pets are not allowed** in any aspect on school grounds. The district acknowledges the important role that pets, dogs in particular, play in the community and the positive impact dogs can have on family life. For many community members, dogs are an important part of the family. A dog can be a joy, but they are also a big responsibility. The school district also acknowledges the benefits of walking to and from school in a family group with a dog. Recently, however, more dogs are being brought onto school grounds. This has the potential to increase the risk of injury to children caused by dogs (i.e. bites and scratches) through dogs reacting

adversely to unexpected noise and/or movement of children. Please refer to <u>Policy No. 250</u> and <u>Regulation</u> <u>250</u> on how the district defines "service animals."





CARSON CITY SCHOOLS AWARDED \$712,250 FOR STEM, SUSTAINABILITY



As part of <u>Tesla's K-12 Investment Fund</u>, the Carson City School District is pleased to announce it is the most recent recipient of nearly a million dollars in grant funding. The money will help fund a district-wide sustainability initiative for the next three years.

PARTICIPATION IN 2020 CENSUS WILL HELP FUND OUR SCHOOLS

Every 10 years, the United States Census Bureau counts every person living in the United States regardless of their country of origin or immigration status. This includes children and newborn babies, grandparents, friends, nonrelatives and everyone who is living or staying with you as of April 1, 2020. In the 2010 Census, the net undercount of children under the age of 5 was 4.6 percent. That's nearly 1 million children. How does this affect



you? The 2020 Census will help determine how more than \$675 billion in federal funding is distributed to communities for the next 10 years—basically, an entire childhood.




TESTING SEASON IS UPON US

Spring is the beginning of the testing season for elementary, middle and high school students. There are state and national tests (SBAC/ACT) for students in grades 3-12. District assessments (MAP) for grades K-8 begin now and continue through the end of the school year and many of these tests are mandated by legislation.

All 11th grade students (juniors) are required (in order to graduate) to take the ACT Tuesday, February 25. To help students prepare, Carson High School is providing afterschool tutoring Tues., Wed. and Thurs. now through



Feb. 20. Please note, students will not have access to their cell phones during the ACT. Also, CHS does not provide calculators, so students will need to bring their own (<u>review Calculator Policy here</u>). Every student has been notified of their testing room assignment and should arrive at the school by 7:30 a.m. All 9th, 10th and 12th grade students do not attend school that day (Feb. 25). If students have questions about testing room assignments, they should go to the main office for assistance.



TIPS AND HOW TO PREPARE FOR TESTS

There's no secret formula when it comes to passing a standardized test. It's important to remember that anxiety may hinder performance for the test taker, so take a deep breath and read through a few practical tips to help students prepare for standardized assessments. And please note, **don't schedule doctor's appointments** before, after or during tests. As soon as a student begins taking a test, if they need to leave for an appointment, they will likely not be able to reschedule or finish the exam.

- 1. **Take practice tests.** The <u>Nevada Department of Education</u> website offers practice tests, which can help prepare children with understanding the test expectations, including the content and mechanics. SBAC offers good examples of practice tests. If the test format seems familiar on test day, kids are more likely to feel comfortable and know what to do.
- 2. **Promote a positive attitude.** Parents should be positive about learning and testing. Kids need to take tests seriously and be strategic, but also feel confident and mentally prepared. Parents can help children feel prepared for the test by encouraging them to visualize success on test day. In other words, ask them to close their eyes and imagine themselves taking the test and feeling great about it.
- 3. **Discuss what to do if you finish early**. It's important to discuss that this is a good opportunity to double check and verify their answers for accuracy. Parents can coach them to review certain questions that were hard and use the process of elimination to rule out some of the answer choices.
- 4. **Eat well, exercise and rest.** In the weeks leading up to the test, it is important for students to have adequate sleep (eight hours is recommended), eat balanced meals, drink plenty of water, and get exercise. Foods high in protein, and water help to stimulate the brain. Exercise, such as stretching and
 - walking, helps to supply the brain with oxygen. Eating a healthy breakfast before school, particularly on the day of the test, gives the body the fuel it needs to maintain long periods of concentration.
- 5. Plan enjoyable and relaxing activities.
 Trying to squeeze a little more preparation in immediately before the test is not advised because it can lead to feeling overwhelmed.



Studying the day before or day of the test leads to increased anxiety and should be avoided. Instead, plan enjoyable activities to feel relaxed and ready.

DOES YOUR CHILD QUALIFY FOR PRE-KINDERGARTEN?

- 2. New Student Enrollment Form.
- 3. Birth certificate.
- 4. **Immunization records** (including Hepatitis A & B, DTAP, MMR, IPV & Varicella). Please contact your physician to ensure compliancy.
- 5. Proof of **residency in Carson City** (Utility bill, Mortgage or Rental papers, Voter Registration, etc.).
